Florida ranks 39th in the country in FAFSA completion with a completion rate below 50% by 6/30

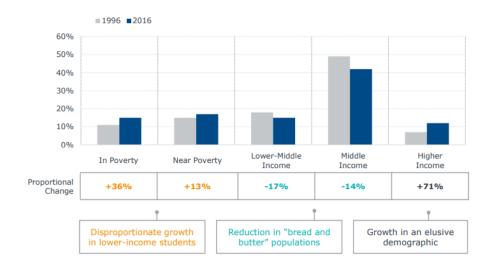

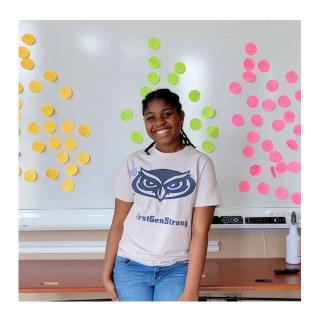

Partnership with TheDream.US Scholarship Program

TheDream.US is an organization that provides TheDream.US Scholarship for undergraduates that qualify as DREAMers.

- DREAMers are undocumented immigrant youth who came to the United States as minors, have graduated from U.S. high schools or earned a U.S. high school equivalency but lack legal status. This prevents them from accessing any federal aid to help pay for their college education.
- To apply and receive TheDream.US Scholarship, Dreamers must have DACA (Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals), TPS (Temporary Protected Status) or meet the DREAM organization immigration eligibility criteria.
- Eligibility criteria also includes being eligible for in-state tuition, full time enrollment and maintaining a 2.5 or higher GPA.
- The National Scholarship Award will cover tuition & fees up to a maximum of \$14,500 for an associate degree and \$29,000 for a bachelor's degree at one of the partner colleges.

Florida Atlantic University: Total First-Year Students 3-Year Trend: Admitted FAFSA Filers

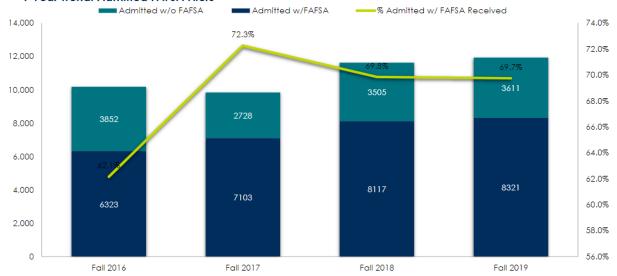


FAU FAFSA filer trend

Florida Atlantic University: Total First-Year Students 4-Year Trend: Admitted FAFSA Filers

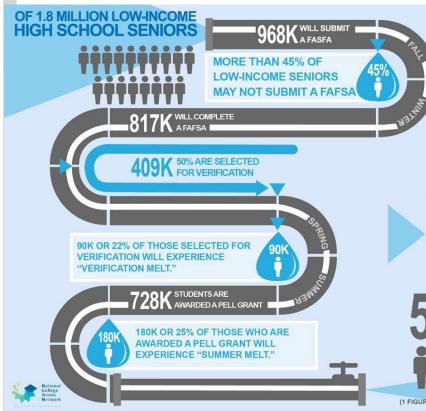

- 1: DO NOT KNOW HOW OR THAT THEY COULD
- 2: ARE DEBT AVERSE OR THINK CREDIT IS TOO LOW
- 3: ARE NOT PURSUING COLLEGE
- 4: THE FORM IS TOO COMPLICATED
