



First Gen students are 10% less likely to retain (70% versus 80%)


First Gen Research:


56% of students are first gen


6 years after starting college, 56% of first gen students had not earned a credential/degree (compared to 40% of their continuing gen peers)


Higher percent of first gen use financial aid, but a lower percent use health, academic advising, and academic support services

Grassroots: few students expressed need & interest Expansion:

Counselor & students asked if others were interested in helping

Eight students committed, attempted to recruit sophomores to "pass the torch" eventually, one 10th grade student joined Nine students took the lead on planning the entire event

Members took the lead on different tasks (needs survey, career fair, etc.

Helped each other as needed

Committed to be present for the next cycle of the event




Student committee shared needs assessment with peers


Survey was open for 3 weeks




STUDENT INTEREST SURVEY






Student Confidence Scale - College Majors & Career Choices April 2021



Student Confidence Scale - College Campus Life April 2021






Event Learning Outcomes



Community Partnerships

Essential to the work of conveying the needed information were community partners!

Information Sessions: Content experts from multiple institutions shared broad scope information about topics such as financial aid, housing options, choosing a major, etc.

Work Sessions: College and scholarship application sessions with school counselors and admission reps present to answer students' questions

College & Career Fair, Health & Wellness Fair: Mix-and-mingle events that allowed students to interact with program reps informally. Multiple colleges participated in College & Career Fair. Stronger than Stigma, UNF Women's Center, UNF Campus Canines, and Marathon High shared information about mental health in HWF.

Opportunities and Challenges

- Colleges open applications at different times of the year
- Alignment or misalignment of high school and college timelines, staff availability
- Space availability: our goal was an off-site space.
- Resources: budgeting, time, staffing
- Student buy-in: what's their motivation for attending?
- Describing the goal of the program to other colleges and universities
- Greek Life and student organization piece did not come together (high school vs. college student schedules)



Considerations for Other Communities

- What is your why?
- What are your resources?
- What are your learning outcomes?
- Who are your key partners?
- What is the best time of the year?
- How can you build support?
- Go to the student: is it the high school? A faith-based organization or other community partner?
- Bring First Gen services TO the first gen students...don't wait for them to come to you
